

At the library, we believe in the **Freedom to Read!** That means that you and your family can choose the books that you like best—funny ones, exciting ones, or ones that show families like yours!





Grown-ups: Use these prompts to guide early conversations about the **Freedom to Read**.



# BOOK BAN or CHALLENGE?

A book challenge begins with someone saying, “I don’t want kids to read this book,” and they try to take it off the shelves so no one else can read it either.


A book ban is when they get their way—and the book is actually taken away so kids can’t find it anymore. That means even if you want to read it, you might not be able to. That’s not fair!

**At the library, we believe everyone should have the Freedom to Read.**


Imagine if someone took away your favorite book **and said you couldn’t read it anymore just because they didn’t like it**—how would that feel?



**A Note from Pat Scales,  
Author of *Banned Books for Kids*, (American Library  
Association/Sourcebooks, 2023)**

Every child deserves the Freedom to Read. Yet today, attempts to ban books for children are alarmingly high. In 2024, the American Library Association recorded the third-highest number of book challenges since it began tracking in 1990. This growing censorship movement aims to control what children read and learn—disproportionately targeting books by and about people of color, as well as LGBTQ+ families and individuals.

Families play a vital role in guiding their children's reading choices. Parents and guardians know their children best. The public library serves all families and is there to help parents find books that reflect and celebrate their diversity and center their family values. No organized group or individual censor has the right to deny families or children the right to access the books they choose to read.

**National Coalition Against Censorship**

Since its inception in 1974, the National Coalition Against Censorship (NCAC) has functioned as a first responder in protecting freedom of expression, a fundamental human right and a keystone of democracy. Representing more than 60 national education, publishing, and arts organizations, NCAC encourages and facilitates dialogue between diverse voices, perspectives, and audiences.

**Unite Against Book Bans**

Unite Against Book Bans is an initiative of the American Library Association, with more than 200 national, state, and local partner organizations and tens of thousands of individual supporters. Unite Against Book Bans connects, equips, and mobilizes the public to advocate in their communities for the right to read and to defeat attempts at every level of government to censor reading material.
